90th ANNIVERSARY OF THE APPRENTICE SCHEME

On May 12th the Halton Apprentices Association held a 90th Anniversary event at the National Memorial Arboretum (NMA) near Tamworth. As I was planning on being 'down south' at around that time I decided to take in the event on my way back up to Scotland.

The apprentices' memorial at the NMA, known as the Halton Grove, has recently been refurbished and improved thanks to a group of ex-apprentice volunteers. At the entrance is a path with pavers telling the progression of the scheme that leads up to a large commemorative stone with a plaque. The main feature is a large apprentice 'wheel' laid out in white stones in a bed of coloured ones surrounded by a circular path of small pavers. Most of the inner ring of pavers is dedicated to individual entries, while those farther out can be dedicated to individuals from these entries deemed worthy of special commemoration. The whole area is contained within a low hedge and has some seats and small trees planted. As part of the improvements made to the grove and unveiled during the ceremony (and a first at the NMA) is an interactive display board.

A lone Hurricane opened proceedings by making several low passes over the 400 or so of us assembled at the grove. The guest of honour, Viscount Trenchard, gave a speech lauding the achievements of his grandfather's 'brats' before unveiling the display board. The senior ex-brat present was Air Marshal Sir Dusty Miller, 210th Entry, who also gave a speech (I had known him from his days as CO at Lossiemouth and had the 'pleasure' of giving him engineering briefs when I was on morning shift).

The Queen's Colour of No.1 S of TT was paraded by trainees, along with a Guard of Honour, from Cosford. It seems that the question of an airman carrying the Colour caused some consternation at Cosford, however, the HAA managed to persuade them that as Her Majesty had granted the unique honour of a non-commissioned airman carrying the No.1 S of TT Colour in 1952 all would be well – and it was.

After the ceremony everyone formed up behind the Golden Oldies Pipe Band and marched off to a large marquee where lunch and refreshments were provided.

All in all it was a 'good do' and I was pleased to have made the effort and have the chance to not only see the Halton Grove but to also visit some of the other sites at the NMA.


THE ARMED FORCES MEMORIAL
